Over 200 people in Credition visited the Town Square, on Saturday 28th November, to show the world they cared about climate change. The Credition Climate Challenge, organised by Sustainable Credition, was held to support the upcoming 21st Climate Change Conference in Paris.

The event showcased 29 organisations, including businesses, schools and churches who made pledges to reduce their carbon footprint. These included, using low-energy lightbulbs, minimising travel, paperless billing, sourcing products locally, reducing the use of chemicals and recycling waste. Loss of Local Services

The Town Council is negotiating with Mid Devon District Council (MDDC) regarding the proposed closure of its CREDITON Office. Firstly, the Town Council would like to make it very clear that it wholeheartedly objects to the loss of this invaluable service. Whilst the Town Council has been campaigning hard to retain it, it would appear the closure will be happening and the service will be lost from



1st April 2016. In view of this, the Town Council is trying to mitigate against the loss of the service by asking MDDC to, at the very least, provide weekly surgeries for residents covering benefits and housing etc. Please be assured, the Town Council will remain at the Market Street offices and will do its best to signpost you during the difficult transition period. Over the next few months, we will keep you updated on any developments via the Town Council website and Facebook pages.



Forward Thinking!

Over the last few years the Town Council's remit within the Town has grown considerably and this is partly due to funding cuts imposed by government on the District and County Councils, as well as an appetite to positively change the CREDITON environment. As the remits of the District and County Councils shrink the Town Council's grows. Consequently, the Town Council is now responsible for keeping the public toilets open, weed killing, highway grass verge cutting, funding youth projects, colouring dual use loading bays, the formulation of a Neighbourhood Plan, Christmas in CREDITON and Floral CREDITON to name but a few. To continue to do this the Council needs a clear focus and so will be devising a five year strategic plan. The plan will outline what the Council will be doing to implement improvements, deal with changes and influence how CREDITON develops over the next five years and beyond. It will include a range of aims and objectives, many of which will interlink and influence the decisions the Council will make and the budget moving forward.

You will notice that these new responsibilities embraced by the Town Council do come with associated costs. In order to meet these additional costs it has been necessary for the town's precept to be increased. The precept is a sum of money collected each year through your council tax. From 1st April 2016 the precept collected from a Band D property in CREDITON will be £74.23 for the year, which is £1.43 per week.

Preserving Public Open Spaces

Preserving public open spaces is really important to the Town Council, so when it heard that Mid Devon District Council (MDDC) were looking at closing four play areas in CREDITON, it realised that something had to be done. Although the play areas in question do not have any play equipment in them, they are important public open spaces used by the community, so it's important they remain that way. Encouraged by the community help and support received at the Peoples Park Wildlife Area, and the transformation this area of land has undergone, the Town Council has agreed to lease the play areas at Fulda Crescent, Greenways and Spinningpath Gardens from MDDC for the next 25 years. The fourth area at Beech Park will remain open.

I look back at 2015 with a mixture of emotions from anticipation, fulfilment and satisfaction.


This year's Christmas in Crediton Parade was a great success despite the weather. It typified a town where people pull together.

Crediton Neighbourhood Plan

Over the last few months the Steering Group has been revising the aims and objectives for the plan, to reflect views expressed in our survey work in Spring 2015. This is proving trickier than it sounds: the aims and objectives must relate to planning. Some community

aspirations can be achieved or supported through planning policies but others can't. Where aims and objectives clearly relate to planning policies, the policies must be written in a way which will be acceptable to a planning inspector. Some of you reading this may not be surprised to learn that language which seems clear enough to us is not clear to a professional planner – and vice versa!

We are keeping pace with the district Local Plan, now due for adoption at the end of 2016. This has given us extra time to look at building design and biodiversity in Crediton among other things. More details can be found on the website at www.CreditonNP.co.uk.



Youth Matters!



Since the closure of the Devon County Council Youth Service in October 2014, Lauren Strand, Youth worker at Crediton Methodist Church, has been working hard to provide open access youth drop-in sessions for young people in the town.

With the funding provided by the Town Council (£4,000), Crediton Methodist Church advertised for, interviewed and employed two sessional workers to support the running of two 'youth café' sessions which run on a Monday from 3.30 - 5.00 pm, and a Wednesday evening, 7.00 - 8.30 pm. The focus is now on boosting numbers and the diversity of this group through publicity and encouraging current members to bring friends. In the New Year young people in the town will be asked to complete a survey about what they do, where they go and what they would like in the town for the future. This information will help shape the future services provided.

To raise awareness of activities available to young people in the town, Lauren will be working with PCSO Becky Tanner to produce a brochure which will contain information on all organisations and groups offering activities to young people in Crediton. All QE pupils will receive a copy, and it is hoped shops in the town will also be willing to have them available.
